

PEDESTAL MOUNTS EXPLAINED:

A pedestal mount is a type of mount which is put up on a wooden base. A steel rod with side supports is casted within the manikin, which in turn swivels on a covered / hidden steel pipe, built into the wooden base. The back of the mount is closed, either with excess skin from the cape or with leather / back felt, should the cape have been skinned too short. All medium and large wooden bases have castors built into the floor bases which makes the complete mount very maneuverable. This is very handy for rearranging of a safari room or for cleaning of floors.

We have seven standard available pedestal mount forms all differing in "head direction". Head direction is determined by the direction the animal is looking. Do not be confused by the direction you look when standing in front of the animal.

1. Pedestal mount – hard right. About a 75° - 90° angle to the right of the centerline of the animal,
2. Pedestal mount – half right. About a 45° angle to the right of the centerline of the animal,
3. Pedestal mount – quarter right. About a 22.5° angle to the right of the centerline of the animal,
4. Pedestal mount – straight. The animal is looking straight ahead along centerline of animal,
5. Pedestal mount – quarter left. About a 22.5° angle to the left of the centerline of the animal,
6. Pedestal mount – half left. About a 45° angle to the left of the centerline of the animal.
7. Pedestal mount – hard left. About a 75° - 90° angle to the left of the centerline of the animal.
